2 Tuesday, January 3, 2012 at the Municipal Building, Van Wyck Street, Croton-on-Hudson, NY

8 1. CALL TO ORDER:

9 Mayor Wiegman called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. Everyone joined in the Pledge of
10 Allegiance.
11

12 2. APPROVAL OF VOUCHERS:

13 Trustee Schmidt made a motion to approve the vouchers as follows, subject to review by the
14 Audit Committee. The motion was seconded by Trustee Gallelli and approved with a vote of

18 3. PRESENTATIONS: none
19

20 4. PUBLIC HEARING: To consider a consistency determination with the Village's Local
21 Waterfront Revitalization Plan and to hear comments on the renewal of a Special Permit for the
22 collocation of a personal wireless facility at 1 Van Wyck Street. Village Manager Zambrano
23 gave a synopsis of the application. Mayor Wiegman reopened the Public Hearing.
24

25 Doug Warden, attorney for the applicant, Nextel, was present and offered to answer any
26 questions. Trustee Gallelli asked if there are any changes. Mr. Warden replied that there were
27 not. Trustee Schmidt asked about gaps in wireless coverage and if Nextel is interested in
28 finding other locations to fill in the gaps. Mr. Warden offered to speak with Trustee Schmidt and
29 requested that he call him at his office. Trustee Raskob made a motion to close the Public
30 Hearing; second by Trustee Gallelli; approved with a vote of 4-0. Mayor Wiegman closed the
31 Public Hearing.
32

33 a) On motion of TRUSTEE SCHMIDT, seconded by TRUSTEE RASKOB, the
34 following resolution was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson,
35 New York with a vote of 4-0:

2 WHEREAS, the Village Board of Trustees has received a special permit application for a
3 renewal of a Personal Wireless Services Facility at 1 Van Wyck Street
4

5 WHEREAS, the applicant has submitted a short Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) and a
6 Coastal Assessment Form (CAF); and

7 WHEREAS, this application was referred to the Planning Board in accordance with Village Law;
8 and,
9

10 WHEREAS, the application, EAF and CAF was referred to the Waterfront Advisory Committee
11 for a review of preliminary consistency; and

12 WHEREAS, the Planning Board has issued a memo to the Village Board with a favorable
13 recommendation; and

14 WHEREAS, the Waterfront Advisory Committee has issued a preliminary review of
15 consistency,

16 WHEREAS, on October 3, 2011 the Village Board adopted a Negative Declaration with respect
17 to this matter and directed the Waterfront Advisory Committee to conduct a final review of
18 consistency; and

19 WHEREAS, in its memo dated October 06, 2011, the Waterfront Advisory Committee issued a
20 final review of consistency;
21

22 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: The Village Board of the Village of Croton-on-
23 Hudson hereby determines that the renewal of the special permit for a Personal Wireless Services
24 Facility at 1 Van Wyck Street complies with and is consistent with the policies, standards and
25 conditions set forth in the Village's Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan.
26

27 b) On motion of TRUSTEE GALLELLI, seconded by TRUSTEE RASKOB, the
28 following resolution was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson,
29 New York with a vote of 4-0:
30

31 WHEREAS, the Village Board of Trustees has received a special permit application for a
32 renewal of a Personal Wireless Services Facility at 1 Van Wyck Street
33

34 WHEREAS, the applicant has submitted a short Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) and a
35 Coastal Assessment Form (CAF); and

36 WHEREAS, this application was referred to the Planning Board in accordance with Village
37 Law; and,
38

39 WHEREAS, the application, EAF and CAF was referred to the Waterfront Advisory Committee
40 for a review of preliminary consistency; and

1 WHEREAS, the Planning Board has issued a memo to the Village Board with a favorable
2 recommendation; and

3 WHEREAS, the Waterfront Advisory Committee has issued a preliminary review of
4 consistency,

5 WHEREAS, on October 3, 2011 the Village Board adopted a Negative Declaration with respect
6 to this matter and directed the Waterfront Advisory Committee to conduct a final review of
7 consistency; and

8 WHEREAS, in its memo dated October 06, 2011, the Waterfront Advisory Committee issued a
9 final review of consistency; and

10
11 WHEREAS, on January 3, 2012, the Village Board issued a determination of consistency with
12 its Local Waterfront revitalization Plan; and

13
14 WHEREAS, a Public Hearing was held and closed on January 3, 2012,

15
16 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the Village Board of Trustees does hereby issue
17 a Special Permit to Nextel of New York, Inc. for the collocation of a personal wireless facility
18 at 1 Van Wyck Street with the following conditions:

- 19
- 20 1. This permit expires on September 5, 2016 and must be renewed in accordance with
21 the Telecommunications Chapter of the Village Code
 - 22
 - 23 2. That, the Nextel facility shall at all times during the life of the facility comply with
24 the applicable FCC regulations pertaining to radio frequency emissions, including
25 such regulations as applicable to cumulative radio frequency emissions. Any
26 necessary mitigation measures to ensure compliance shall follow FCC requirements,
27 procedures and protocols.
 - 28
 - 29 3. That in accordance with section 206-5(B) of the Village Code antennas shall be
30 subject to state and federal regulations pertaining to nonionizing radiation and other
31 health hazards related to such facilities. The owner of the antenna shall submit to the
32 Board of Trustees evidence of compliance with the FCC standards on a yearly basis.
33 If new, more restrictive standards are adopted, the antennas shall be made to comply
34 or continued operations may be restricted or prohibited by the Board of Trustees. The
35 cost of verification of compliance shall be borne by the owner and operator of the
36 tower.
 - 37 4. That, within 60 days of the issuance of this special permit, as had been required under
38 the initial special permit, a fire/smoke detector and strobe connected to the Municipal
39 Building's fire alarm system shall be installed in the Nextel equipment room by the
40 Village's fire alarm company with the cost of the installation being paid by Nextel.
 - 41 5. That, Nextel is advised that the Village may switch to the Statewide Wireless
42 Network system or other Emergency Services communication system in the future
43 and that the Nextel system must be operated to prohibit interference, including

- 1 implementation of the FCC rebanding plan, to current and future Village wireless
- 2 systems.
- 3 6. That, within 60 days of the issuance of this special permit the electrical circuit for the
- 4 attic lights and roll-up door be switched over to the Village's electrical panel with the
- 5 cost of the work being paid by Nextel
- 6 7. That, any additional monthly cost charged by the Village's fire alarm company for the
- 7 fire/smoke detector and strobe horn in the Nextel facility shall be paid by Nextel. The
- 8 lease agreement with Nextel shall be amended to reflect the payment of this
- 9 additional cost.
- 10 8. That, in order to secure the completion of items #4 and #6 above, a bond in the
- 11 amount of \$3000 shall be required, which shall be submitted to the Village within 60
- 12 days of the issuance of the special permit. The bond shall be held until items #4 and
- 13 #6 are completed and accepted by the Village Engineer. If the work required by
- 14 items #4 and #6 above is not completed within the time frame specified the Village
- 15 shall have the right to use the bond to have these items completed.
- 16 9. That, within twelve months from the issuance of this permit Nextel shall submit an
- 17 engineer's report evaluating the feasibility of connecting the Nextel facility to the
- 18 Village's emergency backup power system (diesel generator).
- 19 10. That, if the connection of the Nextel facility to the Village's emergency backup
- 20 power supply is feasible Nextel shall meet with the Village to discuss the details and
- 21 a reasonable timeframe to complete this connection.
- 22

23 Discussion: Trustee Schmidt asked about the intent of hooking up to the Village's emergency
24 backup power system. Village Manager Zambrano replied that this is to have the cell towers to
25 continue operating in case of emergency. Trustee Schmidt stated that he does not want the
26 Village to be held responsible in case of the Village's emergency power supply failure.

27
28 5. CORRESPONDENCE:

29 Village Manager Zambrano read the following correspondence (full text available at the
30 Village Office):

- 32 a) A letter from a resident, Stephen M. Jacoby, regarding Verizon and FIOS TV. Mayor
- 33 Wiegman asked that Village Manager Zambrano follow up with Mr. Jacoby and
- 34 correspond with the new CEO of Verizon. Trustee Gallelli stated that as has been
- 35 reported before, Verizon has no intention of providing FIOS service in Croton. Trustee
- 36 Raskob added that he has looked into this also and the situation is that it is Verizon's
- 37 decision to not add FIOS service to Croton.
- 38 b) A notice from Assemblywoman Sandy Galef regarding Town Meetings she will be
- 39 holding in January 2012.
- 40 c) A letter from Jessica Shweky, LeadDog Marketing Group, regarding the Bike MS event
- 41 scheduled for September 30, 2012. Trustee Gallelli made a motion to approve the
- 42 request; second by Trustee Schmidt, approved with a vote of 4-0. Trustee Raskob stated
- 43 they must provide proper insurance. Village Manager Zambrano added that he has
- 44 spoken with Ms. Shweky and there are some parking issues to be worked out.
- 45 d) A letter from Miriam Haas, Director, Community Markets, regarding a Special Permit for
- 46 an indoor farmers' market. Ms. Haas was present to answer questions. Village Attorney

1 Staudt stated that farmers' markets do require a special permit. Trustee Gallelli stated
2 that generally permits are issued for several years and since this request is for just a few
3 months, she is in favor of reducing the Special Permit fee. Village Manager Zambrano
4 stated that the Village does need to cover expenses on publishing notices for the Public
5 Hearing which are required for a special permit. Ms. Haas stated that she has vendors
6 that are raring to go this Saturday and are willing to go outside at their previous site until
7 approval for indoors is granted. Discussion continued about possible problems if there is
8 snow and plowing and it was suggested to use the upper parking lot instead. Village
9 Attorney Staudt suggested that if it is done, a resolution should state it could continue
10 with the current written terms and conditions, as well as including such other terms as
11 required by the Village Manager. Trustee Raskob made a motion to approve the request
12 according to the verbal resolution provided by Village Attorney Staudt. The motion was
13 seconded by Trustee Schmidt; approved with a vote of 4-0. Trustee Gallelli added that
14 the Special Permit fee should be reduced, but should cover the cost of publication for the
15 Public Hearing. Trustee Schmidt added that he has some concerns about using the
16 shopping center area for an indoor location because that area is very busy on Saturdays;
17 there are also concerns that the farmers markets are infringing on the services of local
18 merchants and about the parking situation. Trustee Raskob made a motion to have
19 Village Manager Zambrano work on the fee for the indoor market and the referral to the
20 Planning Board. Trustee Gallelli seconded the motion; approved with a vote of 4-0.

21
22 On motion of TRUSTEE Raskob, seconded by TRUSTEE Schmidt, the following resolution
23 was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, New York: with a
24 vote of 4-0.

25
26 WHEREAS, Community Markets has submitted an application for a special permit to operate a
27 Farmers Market at 44 Maple Street, and

28
29 WHEREAS, The Village Board referred the application for a special permit to operate a Farmers
30 Market to the Planning Board for their review and recommendation, and

31
32 WHEREAS, the applicant has requested permission to operate an outdoor Farmers Market on
33 Village property while the application for an indoor Farmers Market goes through the required
34 approval.

35
36 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: the Board of Trustees authorizes the Village Manager
37 to sign an agreement with Community Markets to operate an outdoor Farmers Market, at Lot A
38 of the parking lot, under the same terms and conditions that apply to the Summer Farmers
39 Market, at the Municipal Place and North Riverside Avenue property, with the necessary
40 additional conditions for the location and season starting on Saturday January 7, 2012, and

41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: the Board of Trustees authorizes the Village Manager to
42 set the fee for a special permit to cover all expenses related to the application by Community
43 Markets for a special permit to operate a Farmers Market at 44 Maple Street.

10 resolution was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, New York
11 with a vote of 4-0:

13 Resolution Authorizing the Filing of an Application for a State Grant-In-Aid for a Municipal
14 Waste Reduction and/or Recycling Project and Signing of the associated State Contract, under
15 the Appropriate Laws of New York State.

16
17 WHEREAS, the State of New York provides financial aid for municipal waste reduction and
18 municipal recycling projects; and

19
20 WHEREAS, the Village of Croton-on-Hudson herein called the MUNICIPALITY, has examined
21 and duly considered the applicable laws of the State of New York and the MUNICIPALITY
22 deems it to be in the public interest and benefit to file an application under these laws; and

23
24 WHEREAS, it is necessary that a Contract by and between THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF
25 NEW YORK, herein called the STATE, and the MUNICIPALITY be executed for such STATE
26 Aid;

27
28 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY the Village Board of Trustees hereby authorizes

29
30 1. That the filing of an application in the form required by the State of New York in
31 conformity with the applicable laws of the State of New York including all understanding
32 and assurances contained in said application is hereby authorized.

33
34 2. That Abraham J. Zambrano is directed and authorized as the official representative of the
35 MUNICIPALITY to act in connection with the application and to provide such additional
36 information as may be required and to sign the resulting contract if said application is approved
37 by the STATE;

38
39 3. That the MUNICIPALITY agrees that it will fund its portion of the cost of said Municipal
40 Waste Reduction and/or Recycling Project.

41
42 4. That the MUNICIPALITY or MUNICIPALITIES set forth their respective responsibilities
43 by attached joint resolution relative to a joint Municipal Waste Reduction and/or
44 Recycling Project.

2 5. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

5 g) On motion of TRUSTEE RASKOB, second by TRUSTEE SCHMIDT, the following
6 resolution was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, New
7 York with a vote of 4-0 :

9 WHEREAS, the agreement for the use of the parking area at 358 South Riverside Avenue
10 has expired; and

11
12 WHEREAS, the Village desires to enter into a new agreement with Zoja Nrecaj for the use of
13 the Parking Lot at 358 South Riverside Avenue; and

14
15 WHEREAS, the new agreement provides for three spaces to be used for the exclusive use of
16 the premises, and the remaining eight spaces will be for use as determined by the Village;
17 and

18
19 WHEREAS, this agreement will commence on June 1, 2011 and terminate on May 31, 2015;
20 and

21
22 WHEREAS, the Village will pay \$1,200 per year for the use of these spaces,
23

24 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the Village Manager is authorized to sign the
25 contract with Zoja Nrecaj beginning on June 01, 2011 and expiring on May 31, 2015 for the
26 use of the parking area located at 358 South Riverside Ave.

27
28 h) On motion of TRUSTEE GALLELLI, second by TRUSTEE RASKOB, the following
29 resolution was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, New York
30 with a vote of 4-0:

31
32 WHEREAS, on September 20, 2010 the Village hired Ocean & Coastal Consultants (OCC)
33 to provide engineering design services for the repair of the bulkhead at the Croton Yacht
34 Club (the Proposed Action), and

35
36 WHEREAS, OCC has prepared a Short Environmental Assessment Form, Federal
37 Consistency Assessment Form, and Village Coastal Assessment Form (the Application
38 Package) on behalf of the Village, and

39
40 WHEREAS, on October 17, 2011 the Village Board determined that the Proposed Action is
41 an unlisted action under SEQRA and declared its intent to be lead agency; and

42
43 WHEREAS, the Village Board of Trustees referred the Application Package to the Village
44 Waterfront Advisory Committee for a preliminary review of consistency, and

1 WHEREAS, the Village has received a favorable preliminary review of consistency from the
2 Waterfront Advisory Committee;

3 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that based upon the Environmental Assessment
4 Form, and documents submitted by the applicant, the Village Board of Trustees hereby
5 adopts a Negative Declaration with respect to this matter,
6

7 AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the Village Board of Trustees directs the
8 Waterfront Advisory Committee to conduct a final review of consistency of the application.
9

10 Discussion: Trustee Raskob requested that the Village Attorney look into the possibility of
11 pursuing a private nuisance theory for possible electrical impact on this bulkhead. Village
12 Manager Zambrano stated that MetroNorth has received the report we commissioned and they
13 indicated they will discuss the seemingly acceleration of rusting. Trustee Schmidt asked that the
14 Village Manager open a discussion with the Yacht Club about the cost of funding repairs at the
15 Yacht Club even though it is Village property.
16
17

18 i) On motion of TRUSTEE GALLELLI, seconded by TRUSTEE RASKOB, the following
19 resolution was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, New York
20 with a vote of 4-0:
21

22 WHEREAS, on September 4, 2007 the Village Board of Trustees authorized the application for a
23 grant under the 2007 Greenway Conservancy for the Hudson River Valley Grant Program, for a
24 project known as Kaplan's Pond Trail Construction and Extension; and
25

26 WHEREAS, on February 4, 2008 the Mayor was authorized to sign the contract between the
27 Village and the Hudson River Valley Greenway for the Kaplan's Pond Trail Construction and
28 Extension Project; and
29

30 WHEREAS, the Village has requested and has been granted an extension to the contract with an
31 expiration date of October 31, 2012;
32

33 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the Mayor is authorized to sign the contract
34 extension between the Village and the Hudson River Valley Greenway for the Kaplan's Pond
35 Trail Construction and Extension Project.
36

37 j) On motion of TRUSTEE GALLELLI, second by TRUSTEE RASKOB, the following
38 resolution was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, New York
39 with a vote of 5-0:
40

41 WHEREAS, the Washington Engine Fire House was completed in 1979 and the original plans
42 did not include a sprinkler system, and
43

1 WHEREAS, funds have been allocated in the 2011-2012 capital budget for the installation of the
2 sprinkler system, and
3

4 WHEREAS, Fires Systems, Inc of Ossining, NY has submitted a proposal for the Engineering
5 and Design work of an Automatic Sprinkler System in the amount of \$7,637.50, and
6

7 WHEREAS, the Village Engineer has reviewed the proposal and recommends hiring Fire
8 Systems, Inc to perform the Engineering and Design work for an Automatic Sprinkler;
9

10 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the Village Manager is authorized to sign the
11 proposal from Fire Systems, Inc. of Ossining, NY for Engineering and Design work of an
12 Automatic Sprinkler System in the amount of \$7,637.50;

13 AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that is amount should be charged to Capital Account
14 #H3410.2000.12237.

15 Discussion: Trustee Schmidt stated that it appears that the original \$26,000 allocated will not cover
16 the cost and would like to know what the real number will be before approving the installation.
17 Trustee Gallelli stated that she agrees that there is a mis-step from the numbers provided by the fire
18 department at the time of the budget.
19
20

21 8. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION (non-agenda items):
22

23 a) Bob Wintermeier, 43 Radnor Ave., commented again on the FIOS report. He also
24 commented on the Farmers' Market and asked for the Board to talk to other people. He
25 commented on the electronic eroding of the Yacht Club bulkhead. He also spoke of his
26 previous comments on skateboarding on Radnor Ave.
27

28 b) Michael Mamone, 19 Young Ave., commented on the Chazen Engineering report on the
29 potable water distribution analysis; the Village water system, the use of the Yacht Club boat
30 ramp, the use of the Village street sweeper and discussion with MetroNorth running
31 stationary trains at night in the summer.
32

33 9. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

34 Trustee Schmidt made a motion to approve the minutes of the Regular Board Meeting held
35 on December 5, 2011 as corrected. Trustee Gallelli seconded the motion. The Board
36 approved with a vote of 5-0.
37

38 10. REPORTS:
39

40 *Village Manager Zambrano reported* that 2012 will be difficult with the budget; there has been a
41 lot of progress and there are several projects in the Village; included in the projects is
42 improvement of the water system infrastructure; he will have more information.
43

1 *Trustee Schmidt* reported that our police officers said it was pretty quiet this holiday season. The
2 decoration of the trees was successful, but when will the trees be removed and should people be
3 notified to take off their decorations if they want to keep them. Village Manager Zambrano
4 replied that they will be taken care of after the 6th. Regarding the Upper Village, Trustee Schmidt
5 noted that the refurbished lights look nice, the posts look good and it was good to install a plug;
6 do we know the price that came in. Village Manager Zambrano replied that this will be
7 discussed at a work session. Trustee Schmidt asked if we got the deer study, if not, please follow
8 up. Trustee Schmidt stated that brown water is a very serious issue in this community as well as
9 the lead in the water; these need to be addressed and should not be taken lightly; it is the
10 Village's responsibility to mitigate these; corrosion control additives have another advantage to
11 the system as it makes the pipes last longer; several communities in this area have been doing
12 this for years.

13
14 *Trustee Raskob* stated that every once in a while the difficulty of answering every question
15 comes up; Trustees are obligated to listen and if possible respond; he has decided to listen to
16 everyone and vote when the time comes. Trustee Raskob added that the water issue is the most
17 important issue in the Village and needs to be fixed as soon as possible. He stated that repairing
18 the seawall is a large cost and is a large issue that is why he has asked the Village Attorney to
19 look into a nuisance theory. Trustee Raskob complimented Susan O'Keefe for starting and
20 running a business that provides a valuable service to the Village. Regarding FIOS, the plans
21 are, as he has read, that Verizon is buying radio spectrum for wireless service; in the future there
22 may possibly one company to take care of wireless and one company to take care of wired
23 service; he would love to discuss getting FIOS cable service into the Village.

24
25 *Trustee Gallelli* reported that this cold weather reminded her that people have problems with
26 heating and paying for heating; Cortlandt has a heating oil program; residents can sign up and
27 pay a one-time fee of \$5.00 which makes them eligible for discounted fees for home fuel oil
28 from certain local oil dealers. The program is called CHOP- Cortlandt Heating Oil Program; go
29 to the Cortlandt web site www.townofcortlandt.com and click on *CHOP* for more information.

30
31 *Trustee Murtaugh* reported that the *NY Times* on Christmas Day, had an editorial regarding
32 Verizon's worrisome cable deals and he suggested that, if it is legal to do so, perhaps the article
33 could be placed on the Village's web site. Regarding the noise of MetroNorth, he stated that
34 they have had a constant dialog with MetroNorth, especially in the summer, about noise and will
35 continue to remind them that we have residents who are concerned about noise. Trustee
36 Murtaugh stated that after the Public Hearing about a potential to add chemicals to our water, he
37 took away that residents would prefer that we deal with infrastructure than water and that is how
38 his position will be.

39
40 *Mayor Wiegman* reported that on Monday, January 30th there will be a Board of Boards meeting
41 where members of volunteer boards are invited to come together; each committee will have
42 someone speak about what they have done this year and their mission for the coming year;
43 members of the public are invited. Mayor Wiegman reported that the Sustainability Committee
44 still has an opening for a chair. Regarding the Farmers' Market winter temporary location, he
45 stated that he thinks that effectively that shopping area is becoming a little of a food area and
46 offering another food opportunity keeps shoppers who would shop outside for these items here

1 and also may bring in people from outside the Village. Mayor Wiegman reported that the
2 Recreation Dept. has put out their winter brochure.

3
4
5 Trustee Gallelli made a motion to adjourn. Trustee Raskob seconded the motion; approved with
6 a vote of 5-0. The meeting was adjourned at 10:25 pm.
