



Gotwald Gardens

Village of Croton on Hudson

- Gotwald Gardens include a bee garden (this one) and a butterfly garden (across the circle.) These gardens will receive no regular supplemental water and are designed to survive and thrive on rainfall alone.
- The plants are either native wildflowers adapted to our climate, or rugged species from elsewhere that can handle the heat, cold, downpours and dry spells characteristic of Ecoregion 59 (ours!) The bee garden provides nectar and pollen for the many different species of bees that live in our area.
- Feel free to stroll down the gravel path to give the plants a closer look.
- The butterfly garden across the way includes milkweed - host plant for the monarch caterpillar - and pussytoes - host plant for the American Lady caterpillar.

This garden is a project of the Croton Garden Club, a subcommittee of the Village's Conservation Advisory Council, and is maintained largely by volunteers.
