1. Mayor Pugh called the meeting to order at 7:00pm and led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance.

4. PUBLIC COMMENTS ON AGENDA ITEMS:

Ed Riely, 110 Truesdale Drive, Croton in Hudson, stated that we need to review how many signs we have around the Village, in some cases signs block other signs and suggested adding art to some signs, feels that banning gas powered leaf blowers will directly have an impact on the costs to those who use the service, and finds landscapers are prepared for the sound, smoke and dust that is created and does not envision less dust using electric blowers, emphasized that when students are chosen to serve on various committees, it will be open to a broader range of students that include conservative thinking students as well.

5. REPORT FROM THE VILLAGE MANAGER:

- Village Manager Healy advised that during the heat wave, the Croton Free Library will be open as a cooling center tomorrow and Friday during their normal hours as well as the Community Room at the Municipal Building beginning at 5 PM tomorrow and will remain open 24/7, The Village has waived the daily fees at Silver Lake through Friday due to the heat; residents must show their parks ID card for entrance, there is also a chance for severe weather on Friday and Saturday, should power outages occur additional information will be shared through our emergency alert system, social media and website.
- The repaving project along Cleveland Drive is scheduled to begin on July 13th, because the project came in under bid, the Village will be looking to mill and pave Cleveland from Gerstein to Jacoby Street, once the paving list is finalized, information will be shared with the community.
- The reconstruction of the Farrington Road steps began yesterday; the steps will be closed for the summer while the work is underway. The project will likely take place in two phases due to the need to have the steps open for the school year.
- Westchester County is set to begin the replacement of the Quaker Bridge on July 7, the work is anticipated to take 10 months to complete, updates will be provided as we receive them from the county.
- Con Edison continues to undertake gas main work along Old Post Road North, The project is expected to continue until August, at which point they will shift to Brook Street. The work along Brook Street is not expected to be as intense, which will allow them to complete their work by mid-September. Con Edison has also started a pole replacement project along Old Post Road South. Con Edison did not notify the village, the school district or the emergency services prior to the start of this project, which constituted numerous violations of the permit issued to them. We will be seeking penalties against Con Edison in our local justice court for these violations.
- Offices will be closed on 7/3 in recognition of Independence Day and recycling will be picked up village wide tomorrow. Village Manager Healy thanked Assemblymember Dana Levenberg for pocket copies of the Declaration of Independence and Constitution which are available at Village Hall.

- Croton on Hudson Police Detectives recently arrested a Maine woman for identify theft of a local resident, Croton Police Department worked closely with neighboring departments to solve the case, the vehicle driven by the woman was caught on a license plate reader which allowed County Police to detain her until Croton Police could respond and take custody.
- Village Manager Healy advised that he will be working with the Fire Department over the coming weeks to spread the word that our department is 100% volunteer and in need of new members, he will also be working with our communications firm and members of the Fire Department to help put together a recruitment video for our website and social media, and thanked Trustee Nachtaler for her help in designing a banner which will hang at the entrance to the train station.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Resolution 113-2026 is hereby rescinded.

WHEREAS the Village Board of Trustees desires to update the language in the Village Code regarding the keeping of domestic animals and farm animals on residential properties, and

WHEREAS under the direction of the Village Board, the Village Manager has worked with the Village Attorney and the Village Planner to develop language that would permit the keeping of domestic animals as pets, the keeping of farm animals under certain conditions and would prohibit the keeping of roosters and pigeons, and

WHEREAS Local Law Introductory No. 10 of 2026 has been drafted for such purposes, and

WHEREAS the Village has completed Part 1 of a Short Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) and a Coastal Assessment Form (CAF),

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

1. *The Village Board hereby determines that the Proposed Action is an Unlisted Action.*
2. *The Village Board hereby declares itself to be the Lead Agency for SEQRA purposes in connection with the Proposed Action.*

4. *The Village Board hereby refers the Draft Law, the EAF and the CAF to the Village Planning Board for a recommendation back to the Village Board in accordance with Village Law.*
5. *The Village Board hereby refers the Draft Law, the EAF and the CAF to the Village Waterfront Advisory Committee for a recommendation back to the Village Board in accordance with Village Law.*
6. *The Village Board hereby refers the Draft Law, the EAF and the CAF to the Westchester County Planning Board for review in accordance with law.*
7. *The Village Board hereby directs Village staff to make any other circulations and*

notifications regarding the Proposed Action as may be required by law.

Resolution #161-2026

On motion of TRUSTEE SLIPPEN, seconded by TRUSTEE SIMON, the following resolution was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, New York with a 4-0 vote.

WHEREAS from time to time, students have served in an official or unofficial role on the advisory committees in the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, and

WHEREAS the Village Board of Trustees is desirous of establishing guidelines for students to officially participate on advisory committees, and

WHEREAS the topic was discussed at a work session held by the Village Board on June 24, 2026,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Village Board of Trustees hereby adopts the following guidelines for student members on advisory committees:

- *Student members shall be permitted to serve on the Arts & Humanities Advisory Council, Bicycle & Pedestrian Committee, Conservation Advisory Council, HEART Committee, IDEA Advisory Committee, Police Advisory Committee, Recreation Advisory Committee and Sustainability Committee.*
- *No more than one student member for committees authorized to have seven or less members, and no more than two student members for other advisory committees.*
- *Student members shall serve as non-voting members of the advisory committees.*
- *Student members shall be juniors or seniors in high school to be appointed.*
- *Student members shall reside within the Village of Croton-on-Hudson to be appointed.*
- *Student members shall be recommended by their guidance counselor or other school official and have parental permission to be appointed.*
- *Student member terms shall be for one year and run from September 1 to August 31.*
- *Student members shall adhere to the committee guidelines adopted by the Village Board, including attendance requirements.*

DISCUSSION:

Trustee Slippen stated that this has been a project she has been working on for about a year that included discussions back and forth about what is the best way to engage students in this process; how to make it work for the committee members; and how to make it work for the students and the first part of this process was updating the guidelines for the committees. Trustee Slippen stated that her daughter was fortunate to have participated as a student member before it was formalized, it was

an extremely positive experience for her, she was able to use her science research project to participate with the Conservation Advisory Council. Trustee Slippen stated that she believes that we've laid this out in a way that's going to make sense, she has spoken with at least one committee chair this week and others previously and everyone is in agreement that the intent is for the students to have a great experience and the committee members to have a great experience, while we may have to make some adjustments once we see what this looks like in practice, she believes this is a great way to get the ball rolling, we have been in touch with the Principal and one of the Assistant Principals at the high school and they are looking forward to discussing this over the summer. Trustee Slippen emphasized that the selection process will certainly not be based on political ideology, but rather be based on a student's wide variety of interests. Trustee Slippen thanked the Board, the School District, and the committees, and believes this is a really wonderful way to make a solid connection between the two institutions.

WHEREAS the Village of Croton-on-Hudson desires to enter into a contract with SPCA of Westchester of Briarcliff Manor, New York to provide such service at a cost of \$4,400, and

WHEREAS the term of the agreement is July 1, 2026, through May 31, 2027,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Village Board of Trustees hereby authorizes the Village Manager to execute the agreement with SPCA of Westchester of Briarcliff Manor, New York, to provide shelter services to the Village for seized and stray dogs at a cost of \$4,400 for the period of July 1, 2026, through May 31, 2027; and

8. PUBLIC COMMENT - NON-AGENDA ITEMS:

Christian Meyer, Brook Street, Croton on Hudson, stated that he is here this evening because of his concern about the poor level of Village oversight of the Con Edison gas main project on Old Post Road, and while he understands this is not a Village project, he believes there should be oversight of what is happening and described the following: noise from improperly installed steel plates causing loud thumping noise, resident parking spaces taken without community notice for contractor staging areas leaving residents on Brook Street with no place to park, contractors parking in and blocking resident driveways, environmental issues from excessive idling by contractor trucks early in the morning, contractor materials placed against historic stonewall and private property, outdated village information about this project on the village website, and while the Croton Police Department has done an excellent job with traffic control we need village management to address the issues he has outlined.

Ned Rust, Morningside Drive, Croton on Hudson, stated that there are a lot of facts out there regarding the use of gas powered leaf blowers that make a

good case to stop the use, just like we stopped the burning of leaves in our yards, stopped smoking tobacco in indoor public spaces, shut down an asbestos filled coal fired plant in Haverstraw, banned smoking in village parks and decommissioned Indian Point, it is time to deal with another cancer causing relic from the 20th century; the gas powered leaf blower.

David Lowell, Farrington Road, Croton on Hudson, addressed the magnitude of toxins going into our air from the multitude of gas-powered leaf blowers, and implored the Board to stop this unnecessary fossil fuel pollution, he has done a lot of research and the argument to allow gas powered leaf blowers are straight out of the big business fossil fuel playbook, these are delay tactics and does not support the Village asking what the cost impacts to landscapers are and we should not be asking large property owners and landscapers to shape public health; profit margin should not be more important than our kids' health and our right to a cancer-free air.

Ed Riely, 110 Truesdale Drive, Croton on Hudson, stated that he does not support the negative comments about our history made by the IDEA Committee, where they talked about how everyone is being persecuted, and there is rampant racism, and stressed that this discussion should have been led by a real historian who would have given a true history of slavery in New York not a teenager. Mr. Riely also addressed the abortion issue and the sale of abortion drugs, and the development of the property across from Shoprite, which has serious erosion issues.

9. REPORTS:

Trustee Slippen stated that she understands the issues residents are dealing with because she lives on Michaels Lane and is living through this project, the inability to park, not knowing which direction the road is going or when it will be closed, as well as the noise is a problem for many residents. Trustee Slippen stated that she is glad the CAC is going to undertake the gas-powered leaf blower issue and asked if we have an approximate time how long they thought this was going to take, thanked the Village Historian for the wonderful program he held to commemorate America's 250th anniversary where he recounted some of the dramatic events that took place at that time, addressed

Mr. Riely's comment that maybe there could be some public art incorporated in our signs and advised that the Arts and Humanities Committee have actually discussed this at their meetings and it is something we can discuss further; thanked Village Manager Healy for setting up cooling centers, also thanked the Village Administrator for waiving the fee at Silver Lake during the heatwave, thanked the Arboretum for doing a great job repairing the trail, very excited the Quaker Bridge project will begin this Monday, wished everyone a happy July 4th and a happy 250th Birthday of America and is happy to see signs and flags around the Village in celebration of this milestone.

Trustee Nachtaler stated that she does not live on Old Post Road and was unaware of the magnitude of the problems residents are experiencing because of the Con Edison gas main project, as well as the excessive noise from Metro North that many households are dealing with. Trustee Nachtaler stated that unfortunately Con Edison and Metro North are completely out of the control of the Village but would like to talk about how we can hold entities like this a little bit more accountable. Trustee Nachtaler stated that she is excited the Quaker Bridge project is going to start, the unveiling ceremony of the American Revolutionary War Patriots marker was held today and thanked everyone involved in making this happen, and thanked the Village Manager for working with the Seniors Club and DPW in getting a new handrail in the back of the municipal building.

Trustee Simon advised that the Executive Committee of the Westchester Municipal Officials Organization met on June 18th and talked about the changes in the Climate Leadership Act which changes some of the funding that is available to municipalities and also discussed concerns regarding data centers, on June 18th the Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee met and talked about sidewalks, EV bikes, and had an update on Project Mover with Chairman Matt Arnold, on June 10th he attended the Bennett Conservatory of Music for a concert celebrating Juneteeth, on June 23rd he and Mayor Pugh were honored to attend an award ceremony held by state Senator Peter Harckham where Allie Fraase was honored for all of the work that she does in our community, the Planning Board met on June 23rd to discuss a variety of topics, the Sustainability Committee met on June 28th and talked about the train station EV Chargers, battery energy storage systems, recycling program, potential new solar activity as well as the DPW canopy, met with the Fire Council and talked about recruitment, as well as a ceremony honoring John Peterson and Mr. Tompkins, thanked the Fox Eklof American Legion Post 505

and the Pomeroy Foundation for getting the historical markers installed, Croton Historian Marc Cheshire will be speaking at the Community Room on "Croton and the Revolutionary War", and directed everyone to Lohud.com to see a comprehensive story on the importance of the Hudson Valley region during the revolution.

Mayor Pugh thanked the IDEA Committee and the Bennett Conservatory for putting together our Juneteenth celebrations, thanked the Fox Eklof American Legion Post 505 for their help in the 250th commemoration and getting the Pomeroy signs/markers installed, and our Village Historian Marc Cheshire who has been helping to educate residents in Croton and across the County about the Revolutionary War, a showcase will be held on August 1st at the Historic Hudson Valley.

Mayor Pugh stated that he has now witnessed some of their misdeeds by Con Edison and in some instances there has been an acute failure by Con Edison. Mayor Pugh stated that we've responded promptly and sought to have those defects corrected but a lot of other challenges that we face with them, as acknowledged earlier today in the Manager's report, are the consequences of entrusting so much of our utility infrastructure to a for profit monopoly, the discussions of the advantages of public ownership and democratic accountability has been settled for a long time but he is very happy to reopen it again, but within the confines of the current system that we have, the Village will be in touch with the Public Service Commission and attempt to hold utilities responsible but it is a very challenging position to be in.

Resolution
